A young lady born in Nebraska, and a young man born in Cheshire County, England, chose the mission field in China as their respective vocations.

The Rev. John W. Duddington, born in England, the oldest of nine children, was educated in a Boys' Boarding School and Durham University, receiving his M.A. in Theology and ordained at Lincoln Cathedral located on England's east coast. Greek in the Seminary from which he graduated. During this time he was a volunteer for the Church's Missionary Society and became interested in the missionary field which led him to China in 1929.

Miss Irma Dudrow was born in Nebraska, one of four children. She earned a teaching credential and her education included attendance at the Bible Institute of Los Angeles which resulted in her being called to serve the mission field in Western China. Guess what...these two young missionaries, one from Great Britain and one from the U.S.A. met and fell in love. married in China in 1932 and continued their work together. Father Duddington was also a professor of History of World Litereature in the government university in China.

The Red Chinese uprisings aided in their decision to leave China in 1948. They moved to Solvang, California where John became an American citizen.

Further Christian service called the Duddingtons to Manila in the Philippines, where he served as Rector at an Episcopal Church and was professor of New Testament at the Seminary in that city. From Manila he was called to serve as the Episcopal Chaplain at Stanford University in Palo Alto.

They "retired", moved to Fallbrook, but still remained very active. He authored two books during that time. He also served as supply priest at St. John's Episcopal Church in Fallbrook until 1972 and served as honorary Vicar at St. Francis Episcopal Church in Pauma Valley...then back to St. John's in Fallbrook to become assistant to the Rector where he served un May of 1989.

On April 28 of this year, the Duddingtons celebrated their 57th wedding anniversary as well as Father Duddington's 87th birthday. Upon his retirement (again) in May, a proclamation was read to the congregation of St. John's stating that the parish hall will be named Duddington Hall in gratitude to Father Duddington and his wife, Irma.

The Duddingtons have lived at Carlsbad by the Sea since 1974. Mrs. Duddington lives in the Health Facility across the street now, but they are together a few hours daily. They still converse in the Chinese language occasionally.

Conditions in China today grieve Father Duddington deeply, but he is impressed with the students that he has seen on television. They speak with widsom, common sense and conviction, he says.

On April 28, the Duddingtons will celebrate their 57th wedding anniversary; on April 29, Father Duddington's 87th birthday.
